Culturally Responsive Instruction for Native American Students

We recommend teachers use problem/place-based activities in their classroom to integrate culturally responsive principles. Here are the steps followed in the problem/place-based activity shown in the PD video. Teachers may follow these steps or adapt them for their own classroom.

Interdisciplinary Problem/Place-based Activity

- 1. Research relevant issues in the local community through discussions with community members and students
- 2. Develop and share a problem statement with students
- 3. Develop and share a question to guide students' inquiry
- 4. In small groups, students discuss what information they need to gather what specific questions they have
- 5. Each student chooses one of the questions generated by their group to research
- 6. Students research their question (with help from peers if they choose) and present their findings back to their group. This research usually includes interaction with the community.
- 7. Groups share their collective work, including documentation of their process and findings, on a class wall
- 8. Students give one another feedback on their work
- 9. Groups revise their work and put it in a presentation
- 10. Groups present their projects to the class, parents, and selected community members
- 11. Students do individual write ups of their project, focused on their contribution and learning
